Make a Plan - For What You Will Do in an Emergency!

The reality of a disaster situation is that you will likely not have access to everyday conveniences. To plan in advance, think through the details of your everyday life. If there are people who assist you on a daily basis, list who they are, and how you will contact them in an emergency. Create your own personal support network by identifying others who will help you in an emergency. Think about what modes of transportation you use and what alternative modes could serve as back-ups. If you require handicap accessible transportation be sure your alternatives are also accessible. For every aspect of your daily routine, plan an alternative procedure. Make a plan and write it down. Keep a copy of your plan in

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your emergency supply kits and a list of important information and contacts in your wallet. Share your plan with your family, friends, care providers and others in your personal support network.

Create a Personal Support Network:

If you anticipate needing assistance during a disaster, make a list of family, friends and others who will be part of your plan. Talk to these people and ask them to be part of your support network. Share each aspect of your emergency plan with everyone in your group, including a friend or relative in another area who would not be impacted by the same emergency who can help if necessary. Make sure everyone knows how you plan to evacuate your home or workplace and where you will go in case of a disaster. Make sure that someone in your personal support network has an extra key to your home and knows where you keep your emergency supplies. Practice your plan with those who have agreed to be part of your personal support network.

The Year Round Hazard!

Fall has barely greeted us for the year, but, we Minnesotans need to remind ourselves that carbon monoxide poisoning is a year-round hazard.

Carbon monoxide (CO), known as "the silent killer," is an odorless, colorless, poisonous gas. The deadly fumes can leak from family furnaces, water heaters or gas stoves. It can be trapped inside by a blocked chimney or flue. Other sources include running a car engine in an attached garage, burning charcoal in the house or operating a gas-powered generator in a confined space.

Carbon monoxide (CO) interferes with the delivery of oxygen throughout the body in the bloodstream. At

lower levels, carbon monoxide can cause flu-like symptoms: headaches, dizziness, weakness and fatigue. At higher levels, or with prolonged exposure, it can cause confusion, disorientation, impaired vision and coordination, brain damage, coma and death.

If the alarm sounds and anyone is feeling symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning, your home may have a potentially dangerous level. Leave the house immediately. Call the fire department, local emergency medical services, poison center, or local utility company from a neighbor's home. If the alarm sounds and no one is feeling any symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning, ventilate the home by opening windows and doors and turning on fans. Turn off any combustion appliances immediately. Then call an appliance repair technician to find the cause of the alarm.

About 500 people die each year in the United States due to accidental CO poisoning. Another 150,000 people end up in the emergency room. Children are especially vulnerable. To prevent carbon monoxide poisoning, do not burn charcoal in the house; do not operate a gas-powered generator in a confined space; have a trained professional inspect, clean and tune-up your central heating system (furnaces, flues and chimneys) annually; do not idle car inside the garage; and install a carbon monoxide detector in your home.

In addition, Minnesota law requires all single family homes and all units in multifamily dwellings to have a UL-listed CO detector within 10 feet of each bedroom.

Please take the time to test your detectors and replace batteries or units as needed!
