through December 31 of the succeeding year. If you decide not to prepay the assessment before the date given above the rate of interest that will apply is 4 percent per year. The right to partially prepay the assessment according is not avail-

The proposed assessment roll is on file for public inspection at the city clerk's office. The total amount of the proassessment posed \$1,014,971.85. Written or oral objections will be considered at the meeting. No appeal to district court may be taken as to the amount of an assessment unless a written objection signed by the affected property owner is filed with the municipal clerk prior to the assessment hearing or presented to the presiding officer at the hearing. The council may upon such notice consider any objection to the amount of a proposed individual assessment at an adjourned meeting upon such further notice to the affected property owners as it

deems advisable. Under Minn. Stat. §§ 435.193 to 435.195 and city Ordinance (Resolution) Sec. 18-2 the council may, in its discretion, defer the payment of this special assessment for any homestead property owned by a person 65 years of age or older, one retired by virtue of a permanent and total disability. for whom it would be a hardship to make the payments. 
