The City of Rockville City Council will hold a public hearing on September 10, 2025, at 6:30 p.m. at Rockville City Hall, 229 Broadway St E, Rockville, MN 56369.

A public hearing will be held for two items:

1. Adoption of the Rockville Comprehensive Plan, as authorized under M.S. 462.355 Adopt, Amend Comprehensive Plan, that sets goals and policies to guide future growth, land use decisions, and public investments in the city.

2. Adoption of the City's entire Zoning Ordinance and updated Official Zoning Map, as authorized under M.S. 462.357 Official Controls: Zoning Ordinance, to replace the existing zoning ordinance. Primary changes include:

- Converting the Permitted, Conditional, and Interim Uses by zoning district into one table;

- Compiling the processes and procedures into one section;

- Consolidating zoning districts into 8 districts with 3 residential, 2 agricultural, 2 commercial, and 1 industrial zoning district;

- Updating performance standards for clarity and public users, and to reflect current state law;

- Reformatting lot and building standards for zoning districts into easy-to-read tables;

- Bringing the wetland, shoreline, and floodplain ordinances into compliance with current state statutes and the Department of Natural Resources model ordinance;

- Splitting the existing A40 zoning district into AG to allow for parcels of 2-39 acres that are subdividable while preserving the 40-acre tracts under A40 to reduce the loss of productive farmland;

- Rezoning isolated commercial parcels to AG or A40 and concurrently approving a Extended Home Business permit, to better reflect that the primary use is residential or agricultural in nature with a home business as an accessory use;

- Consolidating and updating definitions and adding new definitions;

- Updating to reflect recent statutory updates such as licensed family care facilities, native vegetation and cannabis uses; and

- Making grammatical, spelling, punctuation, and formatting corrections.

Handle Food Safely

- Always wash your hands before and after handling food.
- Keep the kitchen, dishes and utensils clean.
- Always serve food on clean plates.

Keep Hot Foods HOT, Cold Foods COLD

- Divide cooked foods into shallow containers to store in the refrigerator or freezer until serving. This encourages rapid, even cooling. Reheat hot foods to 165°F.
- Hot foods should be held at 140°F or warmer. On the buffet table, keep hot foods hot with chafing dishes, slow cookers and warming trays.
- Cold foods should be held at 40°F or colder. Keep foods cold by nesting dishes in bowls of ice. Otherwise, use small serving trays and replace them with cold foods from the refrigerator when more food is needed.

Observe the Two-Hour Rule

- Foods should not sit at

room temperature for more than two hours, (1 hour if temperatures are above 90°F).

- Replace empty platters rather than adding fresh food to a dish that already had food in it.

Cook Thoroughly

- Cook foods thoroughly to safe temperatures. Always use a food thermometer and follow the guide below:

Whole poultry	180°F
Chicken breasts	170°F
Ground turkey and poultry	165°F
Ground beef hamburgers	160°F
All cuts of pork	160°F
Beef, veal, lamb steaks, roasts and chops	160°F
**Medium Done	
All other meat and fish	160°F

Food Safety on the Road! Here's a few pointers, thanks to the folks at the US Dept of Agriculture:

Plan Ahead...

If you are traveling with perishable food, place it in a cooler with ice or freezer packs. When carrying drinks, consider packing them in a separate cooler so the food cooler is not opened frequently. Have plenty of ice or frozen gel-packs on hand before starting to pack food. If you take perishable foods along (for example, meat, poultry, eggs, and salads) for eating on the road or to cook at your vacation spot, plan to keep everything on ice in your cooler.

Pack Safely...

Pack perishable foods directly from the refrigerator or freezer into the cooler. Meat and poultry may be packed while it is still frozen; in that way it stays colder longer. Also, a full cooler will maintain its cold temperatures longer than one that is partially filled. Be sure to keep raw meat and poultry wrapped separately from cooked foods, or foods meant to be eaten raw such as fruits.

If the cooler is only partially filled, pack the remaining space with more ice. For long trips to the shore or the mountains, take along two coolers — one for the day's immediate food needs, such as lunch, drinks or snacks, and the other for perishable foods to be used later in the vacation. Limit the times the cooler is opened. Open and close the lid quickly.

Now, follow these food safety tips:

When Camping...

Remember to keep the cooler in a shady spot. Keep it covered with a blanket, tarp or poncho, preferably one that is light in color to reflect heat.

Bring along bottled water or other canned or bottled drinks. Always assume that streams and rivers are not safe for drinking. If camping in a remote area, bring along water purification tablets or equipment. These are available at camping supply stores.

Keep hands and all utensils clean when preparing food. Use disposable moist towelettes to clean hands. When planning meals, think about buying and using shelf-stable food to ensure food safety.

When Boating...

If boating on vacation, or out for the day, make sure the all-important cooler is along.

Don't let perishable food sit out while swimming or fishing. Remember, food sitting out for more than two hours is not safe. The time frame is reduced to just 1 hour if the outside temperature is above 90 °F.

Now, about that "catch" of fish — assuming the big one did not get away. For fin fish: scale, gut and clean the fish as soon as they are caught. Wrap both whole and cleaned fish in

water-tight plastic and store on ice. Keep 3-4 inches of ice on the bottom of the cooler. Alternate layers of fish and ice. Cook the fish in 1-2 days, or freeze. After cooking, eat within 3-4 days. Make sure the raw fish stays separate from cooked foods.

When at the Beach...

Plan ahead. Take along only the amount of food that can be eaten to avoid having leftovers. If grilling, make sure local ordinances allow it.

Bring the cooler! Partially bury it in the sand, cover with blankets, and shade with a beach umbrella.

Bring along disposable moist towelettes for cleaning hands.
