RESOLUTION TO LIMIT THE ENROLLMENT OF NONRESIDENT PUPILS

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes 124D.03, Subd. 2, Limited enrollment of nonresident pupils, gives school boards the authority to limit, by resolution, the number of nonresident pupils in its schools or programs and the limit must not be less than the lesser of: 1) one percent of the total enrollment at each grade level in the district; or 2) the number of district residents at that grade level enrolled in a nonresident district; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes 124D.03, Subd. 6, Basis for decisions, requires the school board to adopt, by resolution, specific standards for rejection of an enrollment application of a nonresident pupil and this standard may include the capacity of a program (excluding special education services), class, or school building; and

WHEREAS, the School Board of Independent School District No. 750 has determined a limit of nonresident pupil enrollments is necessary because of capacity constraints in the programs, classes, or buildings of Independent School District No. 750;

THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, by the School Board of Independent School District No. 750 that the following limits per building have been in place since March 1, 2022 and will continue to be followed. The capacity limits are exclusive of Spartan Online Students. The school district administration will provide the required reporting to the Minnesota Commissioner of Education as required by statute.

The District shall permit open-enrollment at each grade level until it reaches the enrollment capacity as follows:

Grade Level	Capacity
Kindergarten	140
1st – 2nd	144
3rd	144
4th-5th	150
6th	185
7th	224
8th	224
9th – 12th	234

The motion for the adoption of the foregoing resolution was duly seconded by Member Jennifer Bohnsack and, upon vote being taken thereon,

Members absent: None and the following voted against the same: None whereupon said resolution was declared duly passed and adopted.

Police Department

Police Chief Jason Blum reported the activities in Richmond for the month of February: 93 total incidents for the month, 9 medical emergencies, 7 suspicious activities, and 27 traffic stops with 6 citations and 48 miscellaneous calls for service. Chief Blum explained that these numbers were taken a few days before the end of the month and are likely higher. Chief Blum reported that people are receiving more of the "scam" calls/emails/texts, which seems to happen during tax time. The latest involves a resident that received an email or text that stated there had been fraud on an account and gave "contact" info to resolve. The resident spent \$1500.00 much through gift cards, trying to resolve the fraudulent issue before stopping to call the police department. Should you receive any of these suspicious messages or calls, please call the department. Chief Blum also reported another scam, calling to say that narcotics were being shipped to their home and were going to be arrested. The resident said they would be checking with the local department at which time the "scammer" hung up. Verify calls and call the department. Chief Blum stated that an investigation is currently in progress regarding a fire in town. Chief Blum thanked those that contacted the department regarding a person acting erratically in a parking lot. This person was arrested for DUI and a few other things. Blum reminds residents that if they
